Natural disasters and their consequences (e.g., flooding, injuries experienced during clean up) can wreak havoc on health care facilities and the communities they serve. It is important for emergency planners to enroll in alert systems, monitor weather forecasts and have a solid natural disaster or all hazards facility response plan that complements their jurisdiction's plan. The resources in this Topic Collection highlight lessons learned from recent events, communication tools and information, and checklists, plans, tools, and templates that can be modified to suit specific threats and needs. Articles in this Topic Collection address specific natural disasters and hazards and elements of their planning, but do not address all-hazard planning or specifics of clinical care which may be found in other topic collections.

CMS Rural Emergency Hospitals Emergency Preparedness Rule Requirements

Rural Emergency Hospitals (REHs) are a new Medicare Part A provider type and as of January 1, 2023, CMS pays for Medicare-enrolled REHs to deliver emergency hospital, observation, and other services to Medicare patients on an outpatient basis. The <u>Rural Emergency Hospitals Requirements document</u> combines excerpts from the Final Rule and existing Interpretive Guidelines to provide a consolidated overview document of requirements for these providers.

New Climate Action Toolkit Available Online for Local Health Departments

The National Association of County and City Health Officials (NACCHO) and Climate for Health have developed a Climate Action Toolkit, providing targeted climate-focused resources. With this toolkit, jurisdictions can engage their community, the public, and policymakers regarding climate solutions that help protect families and communities. The toolkit also includes an on-demand ambassador training that will equip participants with the knowledge, hands-on experience, and resources to speak on climate change and solutions. Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) for 2023 Rural Emergency Medical Services (EMS) Training Grant Program

The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), part of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, has announced a NOFO for the 2023 Rural EMS Training Grant Program. There have been important revisions to the amount of funding available and the anticipated number of awards that will be granted.

SAMHSA encourages rural EMS agencies (both fire-based and non-fire based) operated by a local or tribal government, as well as rural non-profit EMS agencies, to apply.

Review the <u>NOFO announcement</u> for a full description of the training program, eligibility information and award details. All applications are due May 1, 2023. The goal of this SAMHSA program is to recruit and train EMS personnel in rural areas with a particular focus on addressing substance use disorders (SUD) and co-occurring disorders (COD) substance use and mental disorders. Grant recipients will be expected to train EMS personnel on SUD and COD, trauma-informed, recovery-based care for people with such disorders in emergency situations and, as appropriate, to maintain licenses and certifications relevant to serve in an EMS agency. HHS Child and Adolescent Health Emergency Planning Toolkit

The <u>HHS Child and Adolescent Health Emergency Planning Toolkit</u> addresses the needs of children and youth with special health care needs (CYSHCN) in emergency preparedness, response, recovery, mitigation, and community

resilience activities. As a companion to the HHS Maternal-Child Health (MCH)

Emergency Planning Toolkit, this toolkit aligns with ongoing HHS objectives to ensure health equity for all children, adolescents, and CYSHCN and their families/caregivers to ensure access to high-quality care, services, and support across the emergency management cycle.

SPECIAL PATHOGENS

National Emerging Special Pathogens Training and Education Center (NETEC) Situation Report: Marburg Cases Rise in Equatorial Guinea and Tanzania

On March 22, 2023, the World Health Organization released new information on the <u>outbreak of Marburg virus disease in Equatorial Guinea</u>. Since the last update in late February, eight more confirmed cases have been detected, bringing the total to 29 confirmed and probable cases. All but two are deceased.

Cases have now been reported in three different provinces across an area of about 90 miles. Not all cases are epidemiologically linked, suggesting the potential for undetected community transmission. With 29 confirmed and probable cases, this outbreak is already the <u>fourth largest on record</u>. On March 21, 2023, <u>Tanzania reported the country's first Marburg outbreak</u>. To date, there have been at least eight cases, five of them fatal, including a health care worker. Three people are receiving treatment, and 161 contacts have been identified and are being monitored.

CDC Provides Update on Marburg Virus

On March 21, CDC issued a <u>travel health notice</u> for Marburg in Tanzania. CDC alerted state, tribal, local, and territorial (STLT) public health agencies as well as nongovernmental partners to this information in a March 21 letter. The letter also included links to MVD-related resources currently available. In addition, CDC is currently reviewing and updating, as needed, other existing Marburg and viral hemorrhagic fever resources and will make these materials available to STLT jurisdictions and partners.

CDC is working with federal and international partners to support the government of Equatorial Guinea in their efforts to contain the outbreak as soon as possible. CDC is also coordinating with ASPR and other interagency colleagues to ensure domestic preparedness for this threat.

Updated EMS Checklist for Ebola Now Available

ASPR and CDC recently updated a checklist for emergency medical services (EMS) providers regarding the safe transport of patients with suspected or confirmed Ebola virus disease. <u>View the checklist online here</u>.

National Emerging Special Pathogens Training & Education Center (NETEC) Releases EMS Guidelines for Marburg Virus Disease

Marburg virus disease (MVD) is a rare but severe viral hemorrhagic fever caused by Marburg virus, which is part of the filoviridae family that includes Ebola virus. Cases of MVD are rare but outbreaks occasionally arise in sub-Saharan Africa, where the virus circulates in the Egyptian fruit bat. Humans can be infected through contact with infected animals and through person-to-person spread. In countries where outbreaks have occurred, the case fatality rate for MVD is between 24 and 88 percent. Learn more about transmission.

It is unlikely that EMS personnel in the United States will have to care for a patient with MVD during routine operations. However, an outbreak elsewhere in the world increases the risk of encountering a patient who recently traveled from the affected area and became infected.

<u>CDC Issues Health Alert Network (HAN) Advisory on Marburg Virus</u> <u>Disease (MVD) Outbreaks</u>

On April 6, 2023, the CDC issued a <u>HAN Health Advisory</u> regarding two confirmed outbreaks of MVD - one in Equatorial Guinea and one in Tanzania. Currently, there is no evidence to suggest that these two outbreaks are related; most experts agree that these represent two independent animal-to-human spillover events. To date, no confirmed cases of MVD related to these outbreaks have been reported in the United States or other countries outside Equatorial Guinea and Tanzania. The CDC health advisory provides information about these outbreaks to increase awareness of the risk of imported cases in the United States. It also summarizes CDC's recommendations for case identification, testing, and clinical laboratory biosafety considerations in the United States.

CYBERSECURITY

HHS Partners with the Private Sector to Enhance Cybersecurity across Health Systems and Address Future Vulnerabilities

On March 8, HHS, through ASPR, released a <u>cybersecurity implementation</u> guide to help the public and private health care sectors prevent cybersecurity incidents. The Cybersecurity Framework Implementation Guide provides specific steps that health care organizations can take immediately to manage cyber risks to their information technology systems.

"Cyber incidents pose risks to patient data, intellectual property, scientific or laboratory research, medical manufacturing, and ultimately the ability of health care organizations to safely serve their patients," said HHS Deputy Secretary Andrea Palm. "The release of this guide will help health care organizations become better equipped to assess and improve their cybersecurity."

<u>Health Sector Coordinating Council Releases Free " Cybersecurity for the Clinician" Video Training Series</u>

The Health Sector Coordinating Council released today a free cybersecurity training video series titled "Cybersecurity for the Clinician" This impactful series explains in easy, non-technical language the basics for how cyber-attacks can affect clinical operations and patient safety, and how clinicians can do their part to help keep healthcare data, systems and patients safe from cyber threats without losing time away from patients.

The eight-episode series, totaling about 45 minutes, offers one CME/CEU credit hour. The series may also satisfy documentation requirements of the CMS Emergency Preparedness Rule, the National Fire Protection Association and The

Joint Commission for facility Hazard Vulnerability Analysis and Risk Analysis and Training. It is intended for private clinical practices, health provider institutions of all types and sizes, academic institutions, and healthcare support functions.

HC3 Alert: Electronic Medical Records Still a Top Target for Cyber Threat Actors

In Q1 of 2023, HC3 observed a continuation of many ongoing trends with regards to cyber threats to the Healthcare and Public Health community. Ransomware attacks, data breaches and often both together continued to be prevalent in attacks against the health sector. Ransomware operators continued to evolve their techniques and weapons for increasing extortion pressure and maximizing their payday. Vulnerabilities in software and hardware platforms, some ubiquitous and some specific to healthcare, continued to keep the attack surface of healthcare organizations open. Managed service provider compromise continued to be a significant threat to the health sector, as did supply chain compromise. HC3 Alert: KillNet Analyst Note

Pro-Russia hacktivist group, KillNet, has actively targeted the United States health and public health (HPH) sector since December 2022. Their signature distributed denial-of-service (DDoS) attacks on critical infrastructure sectors typically only cause service outages lasting several hours or even days. However, the range of consequences from these attacks on the HPH sector can be significant, threatening routine to critical day-to-day operations. An examination of the group's cyber offensive from December 2022 to March 2023 provides insight into how and why they target the healthcare industry, and recommendations for how

Inclusivity Is Key for Emergency Planning and Response

Previous disasters have shown that certain groups of people face greater risk during and after disasters. This includes those who may have difficulty accessing or receiving standard resources before, during, or after an emergency. Understanding the barriers that exist and how you can support the resilience of the whole community can help save lives during an emergency. The CDC has provided information and resources here for consideration as plans, training and exercise are organized and completed.

Ensuring Health Care Quality in Rural America

The values of rural America mirror those of health care quality: people first. The challenge of delivering equitable, effective care is particularly acute in rural areas, where residents face unique barriers to accessing these services. Despite comprising 97% of the country's land area and 60 million people, most rural communities have fewer health-related resources than their urban counterparts. The limited availability of health care providers, transportation barriers and geographic isolation make it difficult for some individuals and families in rural communities to access the care they need, resulting in significant health disparities as well as overall challenges to clinical quality.

The American Hospital Association recognizes the unique challenges faced by rural communities in accessing high-quality health care and continues to provide support to address these challenges.

Prioritizing Disability Inclusion in Emergency Planning

In January 2019, <u>Winter Storm Harper</u> hit Rhode Island, causing a low-pressure gas pipeline condition to <u>interrupt natural gas heating</u> to over 7,100 residents on Aquidneck Island during record cold temperatures. Rhode Island Governor Gina Raimondo declared a <u>state of emergency for Newport County</u> and opened heating centers for affected residents.

Newport County, located along the southern coast of Rhode Island, is home to approximately 82,000 residents. With a high proportion of elderly individuals—comprising around 24% of the total population—disaster preparedness and response measures are crucial. The aging population has implications for healthcare and social services, with increased demand for senior care facilities and programs that support the needs of the elderly during emergencies. What's more, around 12% of the population in Newport County is reported to have a disability, further highlighting the need for accessible disaster response plans and accommodations.
